
World Book Day

Healthy Learning

Darwin class have had a fantastic term learning all about how to keep themselves healthy. We have learnt about the importance of exercise and have completed circuits in Health and Fitness and some of the pupils have managed to improve their scores week on week which is amazing! We have looked at different types of foods, which food groups they belong to and how to eat a balanced diet. We had a lovely morning learning all about sleep and ways to help our bodies to rest and to relax and pupils spent time relaxing in the sensory room.
