So many students still talk about how much fun was had and when we can go back again, seeing them having those new positive experiences and being part of that was amazing making all the scary rides worthwhile!



As we have had new students join our school this year, we decided to research and then agree as a class ,new form group names. Once again our chosen theme was neurodivergent heroes.

BOWIE—Form Tutor Mrs Foster

Our class name is Bowie!

We are named after legendary trailblazing musician David Bowie.

Bowie was famous for being a pioneer in the arts, for creating new sounds, fashion, films, and followings. Bowie was brave and outlandish, creative and quirky – just like all of us. Bowie was also famous for thinking outside the box and showing all his neurodivergent traits through his many different personas.



BRANSON—Form Tutor Mr Morton-Banner

Richard Branson is a champion of neurodiversity, coping with dyslexia, and openly talking of his ADHD diagnosis. He performed poorly academically, and on his last day at school, his headmaster told him he would either "end up in prison or become a millionaire." Richard Branson has ADHD and dyslexia which for our form is a real life story as to how these neurodivergent traits can be honed and used to help them achieve their dreams.

To that end, Branson's Virgin empire supports 'auticon', an IT and technology services firm that employs autistic people as technology consultants for businesses all around the world. It also provides support for Made By Dyslexia, a charity dedicated to changing the stigma around dyslexia.

As a group, we explored a range of different people who have helped the technological world and were drawn to how similar Richard Branson's experience was with school to many of our own. We have all agreed that if any of the students in the Branson class become millionaires, that they will donate half of it to Mr Morton-Banner!



Watson—Form Tutor Miss Seabury

We are the Watson class named after Emma Watson who has ADHD. She works closely with the UN and does a lot of work on feminism which are both really admirable and closely linked with Humanities subjects.

We had a discussion on many different adventurers/ explorers/activists. We then had a vote on our favourite. We needed a revote because two of the people we chose had the same amount of votes. It was a difficult process for some people as we didn't all agree, but overall we were happy with the democratic process.



LOVELACE—Form Tutor Mrs Irwin

Lovelace's name comes from Ada Lovelace (1815 -1852) who was an English mathematician, and is known as the first computer programmer. She described herself as 'having a peculiar way of learning' and is believed to have been neurodivergent. As a child, Lovelace's nickname was 'Princess of Parallelograms', bestowed upon her by her famous father, the poet Lord Byron. She later worked closely with her mentor Charles Babbage (who invented the first computer) and nicknamed her the 'Enchantress of Numbers'. We had a few options and the majority of the students and staff in the room voted for it.



FORD—Form tutor Mr Brown

The 'Ford' class has been named after Henry Ford (not Harrison!). He is mostly known for founding a famous car brand, but pioneered the modern assembly line, making mass production a possibility with large products and thus be able to lower the price for ordinary/normal folk. Henry struggled with Dyslexia throughout his life. He would repeat different actions over and over until they became like clockwork.



TURING-PHELPS— Form tutor Mr Hitchman

Turing Phelps, also known as the TP's, have opted for a double-barrelled name this year.

Firstly, the continued identity of Scientist Alan Turing was vital for many of the form. Turing, crucial in decoding second world war messages, represents the progress and development made by the students last year and carrying this forward into this year was an easy choice.

Some pupils also wanted to highlight this growth by changing the name and swimmer Michael Phelps, the most decorated Olympic athlete ever, became a clear choice. Phelps has channelled his ADHD since being a young boy and famously describes it as his superpower.

The form had been discussing passionately about the name and I am proud of the solution they provided. Well done guys.

Conveniently, the two together also represent Mr Hitchman's two subjects Science and PE.






AFTER SCHOOL CLUBS


Outdoor Studies
